About the Service

Children & Families

Programming for children 4 and older takes place with Carrie Ford-Jones in the preschool room during the 9.30am service. Caregivers, please pick up your children from the preschool room at the end of the service. Care is available this morning for infants newborn to age 3 in Grannie's Place. Please ask one of our greeters if you need assistance finding your way there.

Audio Loop

If you use a hearing aid with a "T" setting, you can take advantage of our audio loop in the main section (Nave) of the church.

"Collection"

We don't pass the collection plate at St. Christopher's. Instead, if you wish to make a financial contribution to support our ministries, there are donation boxes just inside the door into the worship space.

Communion

All are invited to share in the Holy Eucharist.

Please remain seated until you are invited up the centre aisle by the greeter. When it's your turn, please hold out your hands and the communion minister will drop the wafer into your hands (without touching you). Once you have received the wafer, you may wait to receive the wine, or place your hands on the cup and then return to your seat by the side aisle. Please do not dip the bread in the cup. If you are not comfortable receiving the bread or wine, you can come forward to receive a blessing - just cross your arms over your chest; the priest will pray for God's blessing on you (without touching you). If you require gluten-free bread, please ask the communion minister.

General COVID-19 Protocols

Mask use is not required at this time. As always, if you are feeling unwell, please stay home.

We encourage you to sanitize your hands frequently and there is sanitizer in many places throughout the church.

You may signal your preference to share the Peace in a distanced manner by crossing your arms over your chest, or by raising your hands, palms together. We ask you to check with your neighbours before making physical contact at the Peace.

Land Acknowledgement

We gather for worship on the territory of the Anishinaabeg, and the Haudenosaunee peoples, just 50 km from the nearest site of a former Indian Residential School in Brantford. Very likely, children who died at the Mohawk Institute were buried on the grounds of the school. In his recent report, "Where are the Children Buried?" Dr. Scott Hamilton writes, "While we know that over 3,200 children died, we remain uncertain where they were buried. The cemeteries that have been documented by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission are, for the most part, abandoned, disused and vulnerable to accidental disturbance." Dr. Hamilton makes eight recommendations for documenting and protecting Indian Residential School cemeteries. The fourth is based on the fact that surface evidence of long abandoned cemeteries is likely fragile, if it exists at all. Because any remaining surface evidence is valuable, and because of the risk of disturbance without archeological expertise, Dr. Hamilton recommends that "The collection and integration of archival data and local knowledge should precede any potentially invasive technical inspection and investigation of a cemetery site." In a spirit of reconciliation, may we join our voices with those calling for this process of data collection and integration to begin.



Where your children search in vain for someone to trust, show them your face.


Where your people long for one to lead or a path to follow, re-sound your call in our hearts.
