# FROM THE RECTOR'S STUDY



**T**hank you to everyone who helped to make Music in the Garden a wonderful evening. Thank you especially to Andy and the choir for the beautiful and engaging music. And thank you to the organizing team for all their work behind the scenes! You all lift St. Christopher's up so we sing with joy!

I have been working closely with the Corporation, the staff of St. Christopher's, diocesan staff, and clerical colleagues to plan a sabbatical leave this summer. I'm now ready to tell you about my plans to be away on sabbatical

during the months of July and August, and to take my vacation in September!

First, I should say that we have detailed coverage plans so that your church will be there for you in all the ways you expect during my time away. I am grateful to Hollis Hiscock, Sue Nicolls, Jim Sandilands and Grahame Stap who will be covering Sunday services while I'm away. Hollis will coordinate funeral services should any be needed, and Deacon Margaret Morrison will organize a response to any needs for pastoral care. And I relish the opportunity to spend time with my boys in the summer before they leave for university. Taking vacation in September 2026 will also allow me time to help get our twins settled in their residences at the University of Ottawa and at Dalhousie.

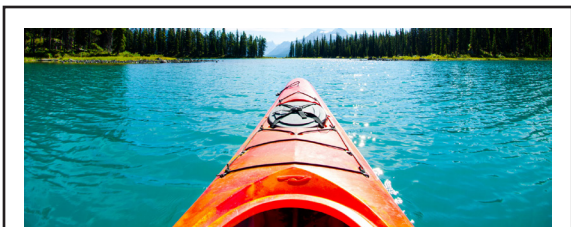
I want to invite members

# PROPERTY

**A**s we finally move into spring, there have been a number of things that needed our attention. Our lawn tractor had been serviced for the winter in the fall, however, at the event of the first cut, it experienced a problem with the mower deck. Chris loaded it up and drove it for servicing to Crossroads Equipment in Copetown. We received it back last week and again, things weren't quite right. Crossroads picked it up for final repairs. It was returned within the same week. In the meantime, Heritage Green cut our front garden and side lawns last weekend. Chris has been cutting key areas with the hand mower and trimmer.

On Saturday, May 30 (rain date) we will meet to clean up the outside property under the direction of Chris Jones, Facilities Coordinator. We plan to clean up the tree line hedges in the west perimeter of the property. Weeding will also be done around the community garden. If you are able to assist, even for part of the morning, your help would be so appreciated. Pothole repair will be conducted in early June by Chris and Mike. Several weeks ago you may have seen scaffolding on the north side of the church. A crew from W. Townshend Ltd. replaced caps and flues on our chimney, guaranteeing their work for 10 years. We have required repairs to our dishwasher, a fridge, a freezer and an air conditioner (Great Hall) over the last few weeks. All of these repairs required skilled tradespeople.

We are currently

discussing the necessary projects that need to be completed with the third installment from the Government of Canada through the the Anti-Hate and Security Grant (\$20,000). One half is to be spent for St. Christopher's and one half for Open Doors. The St. Christopher's portion will be spent on the installation of new exterior doors at our south entrance. Burlington Glass will be here in mid-June to complete this work.

Our Youth Room renovation is now attracting outside groups. The Burlington Women's AA group has moved permanently to this space from the clothing store. A men's prayer group from the Islamic Centre is meeting here every Friday at midday. A group of retired John Deere employees met on May 11 for a luncheon meeting. A recent Open Doors Executive meeting was also held in this space.

With the help of Jody Beecher, a new grant has been submitted to the Government of Ontario for the "Enhancing Access to Spaces for Everyone" (EASE) Grant. We hope to create a universal washroom in the space where the Grannie's Place washroom is currently, with a new access point from the hallway. We have also priced the construction of a ramp to the main entrance of our Community Market. We will hear sometime in the summer months if we have been successful in our request. We included letters from Mayor Marianne Meed Ward and our MP, the Honourable Karina Gould, with words of praise and



support for the good work that we do in Open Doors at St. Christopher's.

The water has been turned on in the Community Garden and Chris has assisted Sam LeGrand, the lead gardener, in the usual annual ways to make the garden ready for planting.

Signs have been installed for Community Development Halton directing traffic to their space in the Vestry office.

In the days ahead we will

be stripping and re-buffing the floors in the Atrium and hallways. Sam has been cleaning the windows, especially at the North Doors. There are tables needing repairs. The plant rack (currently housing the tender plants destined for the garden) has a broken wheel. The boards listing the clergy and wardens who have served time at St. Christopher's will be updated in the coming weeks.

If you would like to spend time with the team that "gets things done" (and enjoys spending time doing it), plan to meet Chris and Mike on Wednesday mornings at the church (10am). They would love to have your help and you will be glad you came! The words "Blue Jay game tickets and Keg dinners" are often heard when this team gathers - perhaps you need to come and find out what this is all about!

# MUSIC & THE PERFORMING ARTS



I had a great time at Music in the Garden on Friday night. It was a synergistic event, an example of something that churches are uniquely capable of. Planning started early in the fall, the choir started rehearsing right after Easter, a team of decorators were setting up early on Friday afternoon, food was prepared in advance or picked up on the way to St. Christopher's. We, as a church, created something where the whole was greater than the sum of its parts.

As is typically the case, the choir was a significant part. We sang a couple of Beatles medleys which was a perfect choice for the audience – central to the youth of many but also spanning generations. We sang their first number one song, "Love Me Do", their last recorded song, "The End" and about a half-dozen others. The non-Beatles material was equally well-

received with numerous people telling me how they enjoyed "In the Garden" and John Stephen's "A Chorister's Prayer".

There were a number of smaller musical performances as well. The same John who wrote the song above, sang a love song that Paul McCartney wrote to a different Jane. John's voice blends so well with Malcom Ramsay's and their performance of Flanders and Swann is spot on: embracing the witty, absurd, tongue-in-cheek British humour. I sang a couple of Beatles songs about the Blessed Virgin Mary. A Catholic upbringing, whether mine or Paul McCartney's, is never left behind. Amanda Shiomi closed the small group performances with a cover of James Taylor's "Fire and Rain" that captured the poignant personal narrative of the song.

Members of the choir

did all of this in the same weekend that they presented a new anthem, "Come, Holy Ghost" by Orlando Gibbons, on Sunday morning. They have earned a summer break which will begin after Sunday, June 21st. Also due for a break is my involvement with the After Hours Band. After four years playing piano in this big band, my last show with them will be Friday, May 29th at the Corktown Irish Pub in Hamilton. We'll be playing a couple of sets starting at 9pm. While I've enjoyed my time with the group and the corresponding crash course in jazz piano, time limitations have made it difficult for me to continue. I wish to share with readers that for 2026-2028, I will be the President of the Hamilton Centre of the Royal Canadian College of Organists. The title is more impressive than the reality. After nearly two decades of RCCO membership, I

decided it was time to give back a little, even if that means taking a break from jazz band.

The last Beatles song at Music in the Garden was about giving back, which is fitting for an evening which was, at its core, about sharing our blessings

and enjoying each other's company. Faith in action doesn't have to be about changing the world, it can also be about having a good time. In the words of that final Beatles song, "And in the end, the love you take is equal to the love you make."

**Y**ou may have already known that pollinators are responsible for about one in every three bites of food we take. If you didn't, that was just one of the many facts that were shared at the St. Christopher's pollinator event in April. We hope that you had a chance to visit!

Through our Open Doors outreach programs, we seek to support our neighbours who face food insecurity in a variety of ways. We offer access to our Community Food Market and provide both a dinner on Tuesdays and a lunch on Thursdays throughout the year. Our Community Garden provides fresh produce throughout the growing seasons to support both of these initiatives. Thank you pollinators for helping our bountiful garden grow and feed us!

Our Community Garden was started in May of 2016

as a St. Christopher's project with help from volunteers and some community partners who provided both materials and expertise. Building those first raised garden beds was how it all began.

In the fall of 2016 we received a multi-year Trillium grant which helped to expand all of our Open Doors programs.

Then, in 2019 it seemed that we would have to discontinue the garden project due to a shortage of financial resources. However, Open Doors was able to access another multi-year grant which allowed us to build a fence in 2020 and a partnership with the Halton Environmental Network (HEN) was created. HEN helped manage the garden, offering workshops for children focusing on healthy eating and vegetables. They also covered the costs of a part

time garden staff member. In 2020 Open Doors took on part ownership, paying a part time staff member for help with oversight of the market.

Our partnership with HEN ended in 2024 and a new partnership with the Burlington Food Bank began and continues today.

Last year our garden was planted with 57 distinct species. Be watching the ebullient in the coming weeks as the Climate Justice Committee will be offering tours in July. The garden is well worth a visit! And if you enjoy gardening, volunteers are always welcome.

*diving into friendship with god*

**F**aith and Feelings – that’s what we’ve been talking about in our GIFT program for the past few weeks in our ‘Faith from the Inside Out’ series, and I have to say, it might be my favourite series yet. When the Pixar movie Inside Out was first released, child psychologists everywhere cheered a resounding ‘Yes!’ Finally, a visual, entertaining way for children to be able to understand their emotions. A few years ago I spoke to a doctor in this field who expressed how convenient it was to be able to use this movie to demonstrate to her young clients how our minds work, how certain emotions can take over in certain situations and how sometimes we can feel more than one emotion at once. In the film, the emotions all work together to help 12-year-old Riley process her feelings at having moved to a new city – Sadness at leaving her life behind, Anger that her parents made her move, Fear that she

won’t make any new friends, and finally Joy that she has a family that loves her, that she’s not alone and that they will help her to settle in and grow roots in her new environment. You get the idea.

But what if we took Inside Out a step further? What if we took this animated road map of feelings and looked at where God fits into the picture? Over these past few weeks, we’ve used this well-known movie to talk about how God is with us through all our emotions. We started with some fun trivia. I held up pictures of each of the Inside Out characters and the kids would think of Bible stories that matched the emotion presented. Here are some of the examples they shared: Sadness – Mary when Jesus died on the Cross. Fear – Daniel going into the Lion’s Den. Anxiety – David when he got ready to fight Goliath. Anger – When King Herod was afraid that Jesus would take over his

throne. Embarrassment – Adam and Eve realizing they were naked in the garden. Boredom – When Jesus was in the desert for 40 days. And Joy – When God created the earth, when Jesus was born, when he healed the sick, and again when He rose from the dead.

Your kids sure know their Bible stories! These were such great examples! We even had questions about why God didn’t create humans to experience only Joy all the time. It sounds great in theory, but we talked about the fact that God wanted a broader experience for us and for us to be able to trust that God would be with us through all our feelings. Through all the Bible stories that the children listed, God never left. And through all the emotions that we experience, God is there too.

As we begin to wrap up our program year and gear up for the Joy of summer,

the Sadness of leaving friends, the Anxiety of graduating, the Boredom of slow days, the Anxiety of new experiences and new beginnings, it is my hope that the children will be reminded that God is with them through each one of these emotions. Just like the Bible stories that unfolded one after the other, no feeling lasts forever – a new one comes along, and another one after that, and whatever story or season is coming next, God is already there.

I hope you will join us for some of the special events we have planned in June. On June 7th, the children will be helping to lead parts of the service with prayers and readings. Thank you for supporting them and encouraging them as they take on these public speaking roles – it is so important for them to feel like their voices will

be heard, especially when they’re sharing God’s Word. June 14th, our Kids Club wraps up with Pizza in the Park. Weather permitting, we will gather at Central Park for dinner in the sunshine. We invite parents and siblings to stay and hang out with us for the evening as our successful Kids Club year comes to a close – bonus, no cooking! Our program ends on June 21st with a GIFT wrap-up, and before you know it, it will be time for Fun in the Sun! Please reach out if you haven’t registered to attend camp or volunteer with us. It’s not too late!
